The weddings were scheduled every 15 minutes! Then my husband went to war and I returned to finish college. Our milk was delivered twice a week from a dairy farm in the small town next to ours. In the winter the milk was delivered to the porch and by the time my Mom brought it in the milk was frozen on the top. It was so good mixed with hot chocolate. It is great to remember about the old days. Our kids don't know what they have missed. Hurray for the good old days- *Bev*

I grew up in Germantown, Pennsylvania. Coal was delivered down a big chute that went into our basement. The milkman delivered on his horse-drawn wagon. I could remember the horse's clip-clop on the brick paved streets. Mail was delivered twice a day at 9:30am and again at 3:30pm. The street lights were gas and a man came in late afternoon to turn them on and must have come back in the early morning to switch them off. Those were the good old days-
